Europeana Network Innovation Agenda

Barriers

- **Fragmentation** leads to Innovation gap between culture and technology (Big Tech dominates AI)
- **International approach is needed** which requires coordination and standardization

1. Cross-sectoral cooperation

Support cross-sectoral cooperation on research topics such as AI and 3D through more explicit (international) policies (e.g. 'human centered' AI) and collaborative research projects (e.g. Time Machine *Large Scale Research Initiative*).

2. Public investment

Digital Europe Programme, Creative Europe, Horizon Europe

3. Inclusive definition of innovation

Support and promote an inclusive frame for success

- social innovations alongside economical and technical
- develop adequate impact measurements.

Support R&D in this area, training and education.

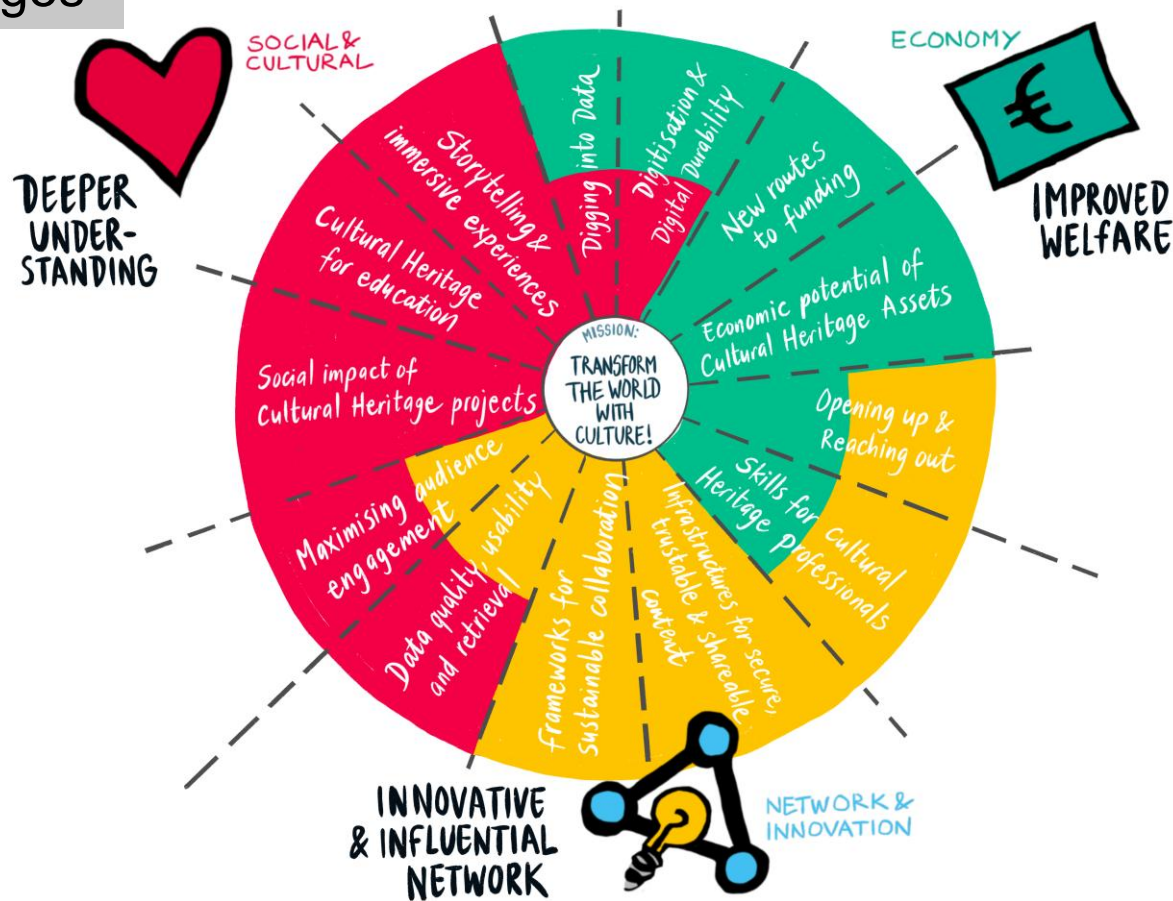

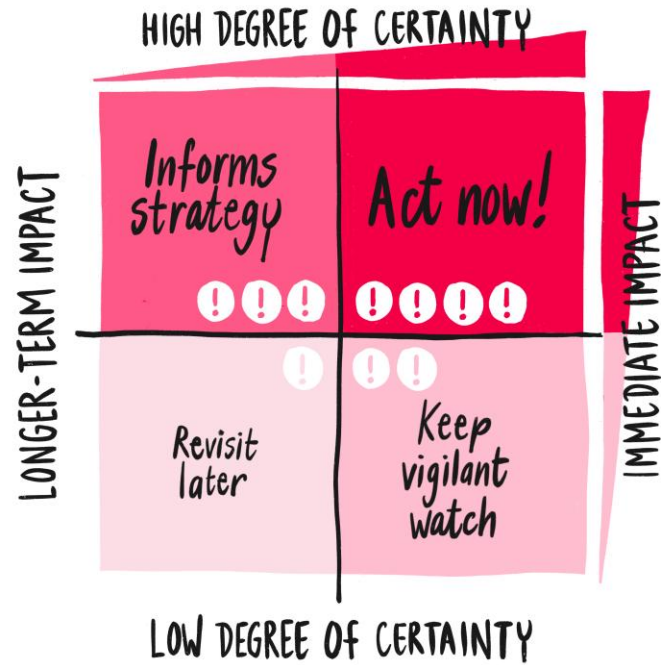

Prioritisation of cultural heritage for education

Cultural heritage for education

Cultural participation is one of the main factors that contribute towards the well-being of European citizens and their sense of belonging to society. Cultural institutions need support for the development and execution of projects and services that reach diverse age groups and create conditions for lifelong engagement with heritage. Exploiting the potential of digitisation, big data and immersive storytelling, innovative solutions are needed to embed cultural assets into education programmes and develop new digital platforms. The ease of access to diverse sources and the ability to create engaging and well-grounded narratives will foster an appreciation for cultural heritage from an early age as well as help audiences to discover and reconnect with European culture.
